2. New Gathering and Mask Guidance from the Department of Health and Human Services

On October 29, 2020, the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services issued a new order regulating "gatherings" which it defines as "any occurrence where two or more persons

from more than one household are present in a shared space." If there is a "gathering," the order applies wherever the gathering occurs (i.e., whether in a public space or at a private residence). A summary of the general limitations under that order is as follows: Masks are required unless the gathering is occurring at someone's residence, where masks are

recommended. In all cases, event organizers are required to ensure 6 feet of distance between persons who are not members of the same household. A "mask" must be a tightly-woven cloth or other multi-layer absorbent material that closely covers a person's face and mouth. The order lists exemptions from mask requirements and says businesses must deny entry or service to any nonexempt person who is not wearing a mask (but may rely on verbal representation that the person is exempt from the mask wearing requirement). A. If a gathering is indoors:

1. For residential gatherings, up to 10 people are permitted. Masks are recommended, not required, if the event occurs at a residence; otherwise, required.

- 2. For non-residential venues with "fixed seating," the limit is 20% of the seating capacity (no more than 500 people).
- 3. For non-residential venues without "fixed seating," the limit is 20 persons per 1,000 square feet (no more than 50 people). 4. Gatherings of more than 500 people indoors are prohibited regardless of the size of the
- facility. 5. In nonresidential venues, if people are seated at tables, the number of people at a table must not exceed 6 and tables must be six feet apart.
- B. If a gathering is outdoors:

1. Up to 100 people are permitted at a residence. Masks are recommended if the event is at a residence; otherwise required.
